a direct line to the mouth of Butter-milk run; and thence across the Monongahela river, to the place of beginning; shall be a separate election district, and called M'Keesport district; and the electors thereof, shall hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Adam Johnston, esquire, in M'Keesport; any law or laws to the contrary notwithstanding.

Section 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is bereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the pafform the inspecting of this act, the inspector of gun-powder, in tor of gunand for the port of Philadelphia and his successors powder in and for the time being, shall be, and they are hereby Philadelphia: authorised,

authorifed, directed and enjoined, upon the reafonable request and at the proper costs and charges of the owner or occupier of any manufactory of gun-powder, erected, or to be erected within the county of Philadelphia, to repair to such manufactory from time to time, fo often as the fame may be necessary, and there to inspect and mark, all gun-powder which shall be manufactured thereat, in the manner directed by the act, entitled "An Act for providing for the in-" spection of gun-powder;" and the said inspector and his successors in office, shall receive for travelling expences, at the rate of ten cents for each and every mile, in going and returning from the public magazine, in the faid city of Philadelphia, to fuch manufactory, besides the fees heretofore allowed for the inspection of gunpowder at the faid magazine.
