## CHAPTER CI.

An ACT to erect part of Greenfield township, in the county of Erie, into a separate election district.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is bereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the Part of Greenfield township, in the county of Erie, shall be a separate election district, viz. Beginning on the verge of lake Erie, where the western boundary line of the state of New-York intersects the same; thence south seven miles more or less to an ash tree, the south-east corner of a tract of land surveyed for Robert Smith; thence west to the eastern boundary of Erie township; thence north by the said township to the verge of lake Erie; thence by the same to the place of beginning; and the electors thereof shall hold their general elections at the house now occupied by Andrew Lowry in said district.
