CHAPTER CLXVIII.

An ACT to provide for reducing and limiting the number of Associate Judges of the courts of common pleas.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Section 1. Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the passing of this act, not more than three associate

The number of associate judges in the sociate judges shall be commissioned in any respective county hereafter to be organised, and if a vacad, in future, cancy shall happen in the office of associate to three. judge in any county within this commonwealth, by death, resignation or otherwise, the number of the judges in the said county where such vacancy shall happen shall be reduced, and there shall be no more than three associate judges in the said county, and the office so become vacant shall henceforth be abolished.

An ACT for altering the place of holding elections in the fifth district, in the county of Lancaster.
