An ACT granting an annuity to Samuel Brady.

WHEREAS it appears from well authenticated testimony, that Samuel Brady has, from early life, been bred up in the military service, and has devoted the principal part of it in the defence of his country; during the revolutionary war with Great Britain, he took an early and active part, and throughout the greater portion of that contest, he has been found employed in the most dangerous enterprize which the exposed situation of our country rendered necessary: such appeared to be his singular thirst for distinguishing himself by military achievements, that he attached himself to no military corps for a sufficient length of time to receive that reward which the law promised to the regular enlisted troops in the American army; in consequence of which (although his services were not less useful to his country) yet he has hitherto in a great measure gone unrewarded. He has now become old and utterly incapable of procuring to himself a livelihood by manual labour, and having spent his strength and employed his life in the protection and defence of his country, he is not only entitled to her gratitude, but for some small relief to sustain nature for the short period of his declining years: Therefore,

Section I. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is bereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the Governor be, and he is hereby authorized to draw his warrant on the state-treasury, in favour of Samuel Brady, of Indiana county, for forty dollars, to be paid out of any unappropriated money in the treasury, to be applied to the use of the said Samuel Brady; and that an annuity of forty dollars be granted to Samuel Brady, to be paid half yearly to gen

\$40 granted to Samuel Brady. And an annuity of like amount, to
