SECTION I. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the passage of this act, the aforesaid Augustine Smith is hereby authorized to reassume the name of Augustine Demetrius Gallitzen, and under that name shall be capable in law to hold and convey real estate, to sue and be sued, and do all such other acts as he might have done under the name of Augustine

Augustine Smith author rized to reassume his former name.

Smith, and shall be entitled to like privileges and immunities as if he had been naturalized under the name of Gallitzen.

CHAPTER XXIII.

An ACT to authorize Ulrich Kissinger of Berks county, to erect a toll bridge over the river Schuylkill, at his mill, where the road leading from the borough of Reading through Bern township to Sunbury, crosses the said river.

THEREAS it has been represented to the legislature of this commonwealth, by a number of the inhabitants of the county of Berks, that a bridge over the river Schuylkill, at or near Ulrich Kissinger's mill, on the road leading from the borough of Reading through Bern township, would be of ad-

vantage to the public: Therefore,

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be lawful for Ulrich Kissinger, his heirs and as- Ulrich Kissigns, to erect, build, maintain and support, a good and sub-powerd to estantial bridge over and across the river Schuylkill, at or near rect a bridge his mill, on the road leading from the borough of Reading over the rithrough Bern township to Sunbury: and that the property of ver Schuylsaid bridge when built, shall be, and the same is hereby vested Property in the said Ulrich Kissinger, his heirs and assigns, forever, and thereof vestthat the said Ulrich Kissinger, his heirs and assigns, may de-ed in said mand and receive from travellers and others, a certain toll not singer exceeding the following rates: to wit, For every coach, landau, Rates of toll chariot, phæton, or other pleasurable carriage, ten cents for each horse drawing the same; for every loaded waggon or cart, ten cents for each horse drawing the same; and for every empty waggon or cart, six cents for each horse drawing the same; for every sleigh or sled, five cents for each horse drawing the same; for a single horse and rider five cents; for every horse three cents; for every foot passenger one cent; for every head of horned cattle two cents; for sheep or swine at the rate of ten cents for every score; and all carriages which shall be drawn by oxen, or partly by oxen and partly by horses, two oxen shall be estimated as equal to one horse: Provided always nevertheless,
