Hannah Bowne et al. executors of Samuel Bowne; authorized to sell a portion of the real estate of the deceased.

SECT. I. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same.* That it shall and may be lawful for Hannah Bowne, Joseph Byrd, James Byrd, and Robert Pearsall, the survivor and survivors of them, executors of the last will and testament of Samuel Bowne, to sell and convey the share and proportion allotted to James Byrd and Robert Pearsall, acting executors of the said Samuel Bowne, deceased, of and in the lands mentioned in the act to which this is a supplement, and otherwise execute the powers and duties devolved on them by the said will and testament relative thereto, any thing in the said act to which this is a supplement, to the contrary notwithstanding.

CHAPTER XVI.

A SUPPLEMENT to the acts entitled “ *An act to afford immediate relief to John Hutton a soldier in the revolutionary war, and to grant him an annuity,*” “ *And an act affording immediate relief to Michael Mullin, and granting him an annuity.*”

Annuity of forty dollars to be paid to Amos Jourdan &c. and to be appropriated to the use of John Hutton.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the annuity of forty dollars which was granted for the use of John Hutton by an act of assembly passed the twenty-ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and nine, shall be paid to Amos Jourdan of Cumberland county, his executor or executors, or his or their lawful attorney, which annuity shall be expended by the said Amos Jourdan, his executor or executors, in providing clothing and diet for the said John Hutton, and it shall be and hereby is made the duty of the said Amos Jourdan, his execu-

tor or executors, to make an annual return to the orphans' court of Cumberland county on oath or affirmation, how and in what manner he or they have executed the trust in him or them confided by this act, that so much of the act to which this is a supplement, as is altered or supplied by this act, shall be, and hereby is repealed.

Account to be rendered to the orphans' court annually.

SECT. 11. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the annuity granted to Michael Mullin by act passed the sixth of February, one thousand eight hundred and ten, shall be understood to have commenced on the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ten.

Annuity granted to Michael Mullin, to commence from the first of February, 1810.

CHAPTER XVII.

An ACT enabling a committee appointed by the Supreme Court to sell and dispose of the real estate of Jacob Palmer, a lunatic.

WHEREAS it appears by the proceedings had in the supreme court of the state of Pennsylvania, that a certain Jacob Palmer, of the city of Philadelphia, has been adjudged a lunatic, and that John B. Palmer and Frederick Heisz were by the said court duly appointed a committee to take care of the person and estate of the said Jacob Palmer. And whereas the said committee have represented to the legislature that his real estate is in want of repairs, and consequently unproductive, that if repaired it would not rent for a sum sufficient to maintain the said lunatic, and repay the interest of the monies which must necessarily be borrowed to make the said repairs, and that it would be more for the interest of the said lunatic, and his heirs, that the said estate should be sold; Therefore,

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That it shall and may be lawful for John B. Palmer and Frederick Heisz, by public sale, after previous notice thereof shall have been given in two or more of the daily papers published in the city of Philadelphia, at least ten days next before such sale, to sell for the highest price that can be obtained, to any person or persons willing to purchase the same, all the real estate of Jacob Palmer, or such part or parts thereof, as to them may appear proper and necessary for the maintenance and support of the said
