county, arising from suits instituted against persons within the said county districts; and all rewards for killing wolves and other animals of prey; and also all costs and expenses of laying out, opening and improving roads, as well as other costs and expenses incidental to the said county district, and the remainder or surplus thereof shall remain for the use of the said county district, to be paid by an order to be drawn by the commissioners of Luzerne county upon the treasurer of said county, in favour of the treasurer of Susquehanna county, for the use of the said county, when such officer shall be elected.

SECT. II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the county commissioners of the respective counties within this commonwealth, are hereby authorized and empowered to administer oaths or affirmations in all cases that relate to the duties of their offices.

CHAPTER LXXXIII.

An ACT relinquishing to Elizabeth Boise the right of this commonwealth to a certain escheated estate therein mentioned.

WHEREAS it appears to the legislature that John Boise, late of Lancaster county, died intestate, seized of a certain messuage and lot of ground situate in May-town in the county aforesaid, leaving a widow, Elizabeth Boise, but no issue nor other known kindred, and that the same has escheated to the commonwealth, subject to the life estate therein of the said Elizabeth who is now old, infirm and in indigent circumstances; And whereas, it further appears that the yearly profits of the said messuage and lot of ground are insufficient for her comfortable maintenance; Therefore,

SECT. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That all the right, title and interest, vested in the commonwealth in and to said messuage and lot of ground, by reason of such escheat, be, and the same hereby is, released to the said Elizabeth Boise, her heirs and assigns; Provided always, That nothing in this act contained shall in any wise prejudice the rights of any individual, or be construed to divest or impair any other title to the said messuage and lot of ground, than that which

CHAPTER LXXXIV.
