And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That in each and all cases where a contract has been made between any settler as aforesaid, and any company or companies. person or persons, claiming land lying as aforesaid, by warrant or otherwise, and where the settler's part has not yet the remainder to been run off, it shall be the duty of the assessors of the respective townships, to assess and return that part only which is the property of the settler, agreeable to his contract in the name of such settler, and return the residue of said tracts of land in the name of the warrantee, if known, if not, in the name of the person claiming the land by agreement, to the commissioners of the county as unseated land, in the same manner as if the division line had been run between said parties; and it shall be the duty of the commissioners and treasurer to proceed and sell the same, as in other cases of unseated lands, for taxes: Provided, that nothing in this act shall be construed so as to alter any agreement heretofore made respecting the payment of taxes.
