## CHAPTER XCIX.

An ACT to annul the marriage of Benjamin Harrisson and Margaret his wife.

WHEREAS it hath been represented by the petition of Margaret Harrisson, of the township of the Northern Liberties, and county of Philadelphia, that she contracted marriage with Benjamin Harrisson on the twenty-ninth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and two; that shortly after their intermarriage her said husband regardless of his matrimonial vows, commenced a series of abusive conduct towards her and neglected to provide for his young and rising family, and in contempt of the laws of God and man, gave himself up to an irregular life:

Be it enacted by the senate and bouse of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That B. Harrisson the marriage contract entered into by the said Benjamin Harhis wife, abrisson and Margaret his wife, be and the same is hereby de-solved from clared to be null and void, and the parties respectively set the marriage. free and discharged therefrom, and from all the rights and contract. duties arising under the same, as fully and absolutely as if they had never been joined in marriage; but nothing herein The children contained shall be construed to affect or render illegitimate, not to be afany child or children born of the body of the said Margaret legitimacy. during her coverture.

## CHAPTER C.

An ACT to change the name of Jesse Homer, to that of Jesse Henderson Jones.

BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Name of Jes. Jesse Homer, of the city of Philadelphia, shall hereafter be se Homer known by the name of Jesse Henderson Jones, and by this changed. name shall be able and capable in law to sue and be sued, grant and receive, and to do all other legal acts, as effectually
