proved or acknowledged, and recorded in the proper county, that in such case the commonwealth shall cease to have any further claim to said tract, and the title to the same shall be confirmed to such warrantee and settler, or their legal representatives accordingly; provided always, that it is not intended by the provisions of this section, to recognize any agreement or compromise, where a less quantity than one hundred and fifty acres clear of expense has been agreed upon, to be granted to the settler, excepting in case where the warrantee furnished the settler with money, provisions or other articles, to enable said settler to improve, and settle such tract of land, in which cases the title shall be confirmed to the parties, where not less than fifty acres has been agreed upon to be given to the settler clear of expense, together with the articles so furnished.

CHAPTER CXVIII.

An ACT establishing an academy in the town of Athens, in Bradford county, and granting a sum of money thereto.

Academy esta-blished.

Sect. 1. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That there shall be, and hereby is established in the village of Athens,

in Bradford county, an academy or public school, for the education of youth in the English and other languages, in the useful arts, sciences and literature, by the name of the Athens academy, under the care, direction and government of nine trustees,

to wit, Clement Paine, George Welles, John Franklin, Julius Tozer, Stephen Hopkins, David Paine, John Saltmarsh, John Shepard, and Abner Murray, which said trustees and their successors to be elected as hereinafter directed, shall be and are hereby declared to be one body corporate and politic, by the Style of corpora, name and style of "The Trustees of the Athens Academy," and by the same name shall have perpetual succession, and shall be able to sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded in all courts of record and elsewhere, and shall be competent and capable in law and equity to take and to hold, to them and their successors, for the use of the said academy, lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods and chattels, of what kind, nature or quality whatsoever, real, personal ormixed, by gift, grant, bargain, sale, con-

veyance, assurance, will, devise or bequest, from any person or persons whomsoever capable of making the same, and the same from time to time to grant, bargain, sell, demise, alien, dispose of, for the use of said academy; and to erect such buildings as may Powers and price to do all and singular the matters vileges. be necessary; and generally to do all and singular the matters and things which shall be lawful for them to do for the well being of said academy, and the due management and ordering the affairs thereof,

SECT. II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That all by-laws, ordinances, and proceedings of the corporar By-laws and proceedings to be tion, shall be fairly and regularly entered in a book to be kept recorded. for that purpose, and no misnomer of the said corporation shall Misnomer not to defeat or annul any gift, grant, devise, or bequest, to the same; vise, &c. provided, the intent of the parties shall sufficiently appear on Proviso. the face of the gift, grant, will, or other writing, whereby any estate or other interest was intended to pass to the said corporation; nor Nonusers not to shall any nonuser of the rights, liberties, privileges, jurisdiction of privileges, and authority, hereby granted to the said corporation, create or in anywise cause a forfeiture thereof.

SECT. IV. CHAPTER CXX.

An ACT laying a tax on dogs, in the counties of Washington and Fayette, and for other purposes.
