

CHAPTER CXXXII.

An ACT granting a tract of donation land to Thomas Vaughan, an old soldier.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the officers of the land office be, and they are hereby directed to draw and patent a tract of donation land unto Thomas Vaughan, containing two hundred acres.

200 acres of land to be patented to Thomas Vaughan.

CHAPTER CXXXIII.

An ACT for the relief of William Campbell.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the accountant department be authorized to settle the accounts of William Campbell, who acted as quarter-master to a detachment of volunteer militia that marched to the frontier of this state, on an alarm that the Indians and British had in large numbers landed at Cleveland, immediately after the surrender of general Hull, and allow him what they think reasonable and just for supplying them with provisions, baggage wagons, forage, and other necessary articles, furnished by him to the militia aforesaid, which amount shall be paid by the state treasurer in the usual manner.

CHAPTER CXXXIV.

An ACT to provide for the purchase of ammunition and military stores.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly

met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the governor be and he is hereby authorized to purchase, or cause to be purchased, a quantity of such ammunition and military stores as he may deem most useful and necessary to meet any exigency in which the aid of this state might be speedily required, and he is hereby authorized as occasion may require either to appropriate the same for the particular use of the troops of this state, or to furnish them to the government of the United States under such arrangements as he may think most expedient.

Governor authorized to purchase ammunition, &c.

How to be distributed.

SECT. II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That for the purpose of making the purchase contemplated in the foregoing section, the sum of fifty thousand dollars shall be immediately placed at the disposal of the governor, out of any unappropriated monies in the treasury.

50 000 dollars appropriated for the foregoing purposes.

CHAPTER CXXXV.

An ACT to dissolve the marriage contract of William Wason, and Jemima his wife.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the legislature, that William Wason, of Franklin county, and Jemima Wilkinson, were joined in marriage on the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eleven, and that at a court of quarter sessions for Franklin county, (last November term,) she was convicted on two indictments for larceny, and is at present confined in the jail of said county: Therefore,

SECT. I. Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the marriage contract entered into by and between William Wason and Jemima Wilkinson, shall be and is hereby dissolved, annulled and made void, and that the said William Wason and Jemima his wife are released and set free from the contract, and from all rights, obligations and duties, by reason of said contract and marriage, as if the same had never been entered into; but nothing herein contained, shall be con-
