II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the said Michael Crow shall, before he proceeds to sell and convey the said mills and plantation enter into recognizance with sufficient sureties before the orphans' court of the county of Fayette, conditioned for the faithful execution of the trust in him confided and for the performance of the powers hereby granted.

CHAPTER CLIV.

An ACT dissolving the marriage of Michael Miller and Catharine Miller.

WHEREAS it appears to the legislature that Michael Miller, of the township of Guildford, county of Franklin, and state of Pennsylvania, was on the eighth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and three, joined in matrimony with a certain Catharine Rock of the same county with whom he lived and cohabited until the eighth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eleven, and during which time they had three children, and that the said Catharine, regardless of the laws and her matrimonial vows did conduct herself in a manner irregular and unbecoming a wife, and on the said eighth day of July, did elope in company with a married man from her said husband and three small children, and has not since lived or cohabited with her said husband; and that it further appears that the said Michael did demean himself as a good and kind husband, and is reputed a man of good morals and truth, and is desirous that the marriage of him and the said Catharine be dissolved by the legislature of the state, and it being just and reasonable that relief should be afforded: Therefore,

SECT. I. *Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That*

Marriage contract of Michael and Catharine Miller, made null and void.

But the legitimacy of their children shall not be affected thereby.

the marriage contract entered into by the said Michael and Catharine Miller, be and the same is hereby declared to be null and void, and they are hereby set free and discharged from the marriage contract, and all the duties arising under the same as fully and absolutely as if they had never been joined in marriage, but nothing herein contained shall be construed to affect or render illegitimate any child or children born of the body of the said Catharine during her coverture.

CHAPTER CLV.

An ACT for the relief of John Blain, of Venango county, and David Ritchey, of Washington county, soldiers of the revolutionary war; and of Mary Bell, of York county.

Annuities of 40 dollars each, granted to John Blain, David Ritchey, and Mary Bell.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the state treasurer be and he is hereby directed to pay unto John Blain, of Venango county, Mary Bell, of York county, widow of David Bell, and David Ritchey, of Washington county, or their orders, the sum of forty dollars each, immediately after the passing of this act, and an annuity of forty dollars each, to commence the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, to be paid half yearly during life.*
