## CHAPTER CLVI.

An ACT to enable Samuel Mason, of the city of Philadelphia, to execute a deed of conveyance of a lot of ground therein mentioned.

WHEREAS it hath been represented to the legislature, that Elizabeth Gill, of the city of Philadelphia, is now, and for some time past hath been a lunatic, or non compos mentis, that she is indebted in various sums of money, and is destitute of immediate means of support; and whereas, justice as well as the comfort of the said lunatic demand that certain real estate belonging to the said Elizabeth Gill, should be sold in order that her debts may be paid, and that the expenses that may attend her support may be defrayed: Therefore,

Sect. 1. Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That samuel Mason Samuel Mason be and he hereby is authorized to sell and dis-sell the real pose of to the highest bidder, at public auction, and in due estate of beth Gill. form of law execute a deed of conveyance for a certain lot of ground, with the improvements thereon erected, situate in Key's alley, between Front and Second streets from the river Delaware, and between Vine and Race streets in the said city, with the appurtenances, for the best price that can be gotten for the same, which deed of conveyance so executed, shall be as good and available in law as if the said Elizabeth Gill were not or had not been deprived of her understanding, and had herself duly executed the same; provided, that before the said Proviso. Samuel Mason shall proceed to sell or convey the aforesaid estate, he shall enter into recognizance with sufficient security, before the orphans' court of the county of Philadelphia, for the faithful discharge of the trust reposed in him by this act; and that the said Samuel Mason, his heirs, executors or administrators, shall render a true account of the residue, if any, of the proceeds of the property authorized to be sold which may remain in his or their hands, at the time of her death; and that he or they shall pay over the same to such person or persons as may be legally entitled to receive the said surplus; and provided also, that the legal rights of all other persons shall Proviso. remain as fully and effectually as if this act had not been passed.
