

said corporation be and remain and be had and enjoyed by the said corporation in as full and ample a manner as if such separation had not been made:

Powers and privileges of the corporation not impaired by this act.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the trustees of the Second Presbyterian Church in the city of Philadelphia be, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, to grant and convey by good and proper deed or deeds or assurances in the law for the use of the church in the Northern Liberties, the real estate which by the said articles of separation was agreed should be the exclusive property of said church, and also the right of burial also by said articles agreed to be held by said church, which conveyance may be made either to trustees for the use of said church, or in case the said church shall be hereafter incorporated, then to the same by its corporate name.

Trustees of Second Presbyterian Church authorized to convey real estate.

SECT. III. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the said corporation be and the same is hereby enabled to have and to hold messuages, houses, lands and tenements, rents, annuities and other hereditaments and real estates, not exceeding the clear yearly value of two thousand dollars lawful money of the United States; which sum shall be taken and esteemed exclusive of the monies arising from the letting of the pews, and the contributions belonging to the church, and also exclusive of the monies arising from the opening of the ground for burials.

May hold property to the amount of 2000 dollars exclusively of pew-rent, &c.

CHAPTER XCII.

An ACT for the relief of Henry M'Ewen and Jacob Rosenstelle, old soldiers.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the state treasurer be, and he is hereby directed to pay to Henry M'Ewen, or order, the sum of forty dollars, immediately after the passing of this act, and that an annuity of forty dollars be granted for the use of the said Henry M'Ewen, for life, to be paid half yearly to Francis M'Ewen, of Centre county, his executors or administrators, or his or their order, to commence on the first day of January last, which annuity shall be expended by the said Francis M'Ewen his executors or administrators, or his or their lawful attorney, in providing clothing and diet for the said Henry M'Ewen, and it shall be the duty of the said Francis M'Ewen his executors or administrators or his or their lawful at-

torney to make an annual return to the orphan's court of Centre county on oath or affirmation, how and in what manner he or they have executed the trust in him or them confided by this act; and the clerk of said court shall perform all the services directed by this act, without fee or reward.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the state treasurer be and he is hereby directed to pay to Jacob Rosenstelle of Westmoreland county or order, the sum of fifty dollars out of any money in the treasury.

CHAPTER XCIII.

An ACT to erect the towns of Bellefonte and Smithfield in Centre county into a borough, and to repeal the act heretofore passed incorporating the borough of Bellefonte.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the towns of Bellefonte and Smithfield, in the county of Centre, within the following boundaries, to wit, beginning at Spring creek where Lamb street adjoins the said creek, thence up the said street to the end thereof, thence so as to include all the out lots sold by the proprietors of the town of Bellefonte, thence to the head of the big spring, thence to spring creek including the spring and the creek therefrom in the borough, thence up spring creek to the lane which divides John McKees field from Benjamin William's lots, thence along said lane and the road leading to the Bellefonte mills to the north side of James Steele's lots, thence including said lots to the place of beginning, shall be and the same is hereby erected into a borough under the name and title of "The Borough of Bellefonte."

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the citizens of the said borough entitled to vote for members of the general assembly, having resided within the said borough at least six months preceding the election, shall have power on the first Monday in May next, and on the same day in every year thereafter, to meet at the court house in said borough, and then and there between the hours of one and five in the afternoon elect by ballot one chief burgess, one assistant burgess, and seven other citizens to be a town council, and shall also elect as aforesaid one high constable; all of whom shall be citizens residing in the said borough; but previous to the opening of the said election, such of the citizens as are present at the court house shall elect three
