CHAPTER CIV.

An ACT authorising the trustees of the Methodist Episcopal church in the borough of Chambersburg, to sell a certain lot of ground.

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the trustees of the Methodist episcopal church in the borough of Chambersburg, in the county of Franklin, be, and they are hereby authorised to sell and convey, in fee simple or otherwise, a certain lot of ground situate on the south side of Queen street in said borough, containing sixty-four feet in breadth and two hundred and fifty-six feet in depth, adjoining lots of Edward Crawford and others, and after deducting the necessary expenses, shall apply the proceeds thereof as may be deemed most conducive to the interests of the said church: Provided, That nothing in this act shall be understood to prejudice or impair the rights of any other person or persons.

CHAPTER CV.

An ACT providing for the redemption of certain certificates.

Sect. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the accountant officers be, and they are hereby directed to liquicertificate to date and settle the amount due on a certificate of funded debt, number thirteen thousand four hundred and fifty-one, issued to Peter Olinger, late of the county of York, deceased, for ten pounds ten shillings, as if the same had not been barred by the act passed on the fourth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and five, and the sum due thereon shall be paid to the executor of the said Peter Olinger, by a warrant to be drawn by the auditor general on the state treasurer.

CHAPTER CVI.

An ACT authorising Joseph Budd and Joshua Budd to build a toll bridge across the Youghiogeny river, in Westmoreland county, and for extending the time for building a bridge over the river Juniata at Millerstown, in Cumberland county.

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly bridge. met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be lawful for Joseph Budd and Joshua Budd, their heirs and assigns, to erect, build, support and maintain a Vested in Jogood and substantial bridge over and across the Youghiogeny seph and river at or near their ferry, where the great road from Somerset Joshua Budd. to Washington crosses the same, in Westmoreland county, and that the property of said bridge, when built, shall be, and the same is hereby vested in the said Joseph Budd and Joshua Budd, their heirs and assigns for ever; and that the said Joseph and Rates of toll. Joshua Budd, their heirs and assigns, may demand and receive toll from travellers and others not exceeding the following rates, viz: For every coach, landau, chariot, phæton, chair or other pleasurable carriage, for each horse drawing the same, fifteen cents; for every loaded waggon or cart, for each horse drawing the same, twelve and an half cents; for the same carriages when empty, for each horse drawing the same, nine cents; for every sleigh or sled, ten cents for each horse drawing the same; for every single horse and rider, six cents; for every horse or mule with their burden or load, four cents; for every horse or mule without a burden, three cents; for every foot passenger, one cent; for each head of horned cattle, two cents; for each sheep or swine, one cent; and for all waggons or carriages which shall be drawn by oxen, or partly by oxen and partly by Proviso horses, two oxen shall be estimated as equal to one horse in Exemption computing the toll, and each mule as equal to one horse: Pro-from toll in vided, That no toll shall be demanded or taken from any per-certain cases.
