CHAPTER XVII.

AN ACT

To enable Christian Cline and John Ditman, administrators of Henry Ditman, deceased, to convey certain real estate.

WHEREAS Henry Ditman in his life time, by parol agreement sold about two acres of land in Hempfield township, in the county of Westmoreland, to Emick Royer, who paid to the said Henry the purchase money in full, and got possession of the property. That the said Emick Royer afterwards died intestate, and that the said land was sold by virtue of

an order of the orphans' court of Westmoreland county, to Jonas Kimmel, upon the petition of Henry Alshouse and James Irwen, administrators of all and singular the goods and chattels of the said Emick Royer, who are unable to confirm the title in the said purchaser as no deed was ever made from the said Ditman to said Royer. And whereas the said Henry Ditman in his lifetime, sold about two acres part of the same tract of land to one Adam Briney, who became insolvent and left the county, and the said piece of land was sold at sheriff's sale as the property of the said Adam Briney to the said Emick Royer, and upon the aforesaid petition of the administrators of Emick Royer, and in pursuance of the same order of orphans' court, the said land was sold to the aforesaid Jonas Kimmel; but no deed can be found conveying the title from the said Henry Ditman to the said Adam Briney, by reason of which the title cannot be perfected in the said Jonas Kimmel:

CHAPTER XVIII.

AN ACT

To authorise John Eisenhard, one of the administrators of the estate of Andrew Eisenhard, late of Lehigh county, deceased, to complete the title of certain real estate therein mentioned.

Sect. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That John Eisenhard, one of the administrators of Andrew Eisenhard, late of Maccungie township, in the county of Lehigh, deceased, be, and he is hereby authorised to convey by lawful deeds in fee simple to Jacob Eisenhard, thirty one acres forty-three perches and allowance, and to George Eisenhard thirty-five acres and seven perches strict measure. of lands in the township of Maccungie, in the county of Lehigh, bounded by lands of John Eisenhard and others, which deeds when so executed shall be recorded and be as good and available in law as if they had been executed by the said Andrew Eisenhard in his life time: Provided, That the legal rights of all other persons shall be saved and reserved, and shall remain as fully as if this act had not been passed.
