June next, and shall cause a draft of said road to be deposited in the office of the Secretary of this Commonwealth, and shall also deposit a copy of said draft in the office of the clerk of quarter sessions of the respective counties through which said road may pass, which shall be a record thereof, and from thenceforth the said road shall be to all intents and purposes a public highway, and shall be opened and repaired in all respects as other roads are opened and repaired, which are laid out by order of the courts of quarter sessions of the counties aforesaid.

SECT. 2. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That each of the said commissioners before he enters on the duties of said appointment, shall take and subscribe before some justice of the peace an oath or affirmation, faithfully and impartially to perform the duties required of him by this act, and shall receive two dollars for each day he or they shall be necessarily employed in said work, together with a reasonable allowance for chain carriers and one marker, and the accounts of said commissioners shall be adjusted and settled by the county commissioners of Fayette and Greene, and paid out of the respective county treasuries on warrant drawn by the county commissioners of the same, in proportion to the distance the said road may pass through each county.

CHAPTER X.

*AN ACT*

Empowering James Campbell and M<sup>r</sup>Farland Campbell, executors of the last will of James Campbell, deceased, to execute a deed of release.

WHEREAS, it has been represented to the legislature that James Campbell and Charles Campbell, two of the sons of William Campbell, late of the county of Franklin, deceased, were jointly seized of a tract of land in said county, by virtue of their said father's last will and testament, and a deed of conveyance from William Campbell the younger; and

the said Charles with the consent of the said James, surveyed and set off to a certain John Wilson his moiety of said land, and the said John now holds the same, but the said James having since died without executing any deed of partition or release of his title or interest therein, by reason whereof no patent can be issued to the said John Wilson, who therefore declines paying that part of the purchase money yet remaining due, and the executors of the said James Campbell have by their petition prayed to be authorised by law to release to the said John Wilson that part of the said tract surveyed and set off to him as aforesaid.

Therefore,

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That James Campbell and M. Farland Campbell, executors of the last will and testament of James Campbell, late of Franklin county, deceased, be, and they are hereby authorised and empowered to execute and deliver to John Wilson, a deed of release for a tract of land in Franklin county, which was sold and conveyed to the said Wilson by Charles Campbell, which release shall be valid against all persons claiming under the said James Campbell, deceased.
