

## CHAPTER LXX.

*AN ACT*

Establishing a Ferry over the North Branch of Susquehanna, opposite to Danville in the county of Columbia.

WHEREAS Daniel Montgomery and John Gearhart, have represented that they are the owners of the ferry over the North Branch of Susquehanna, and the landing opposite to Danville, in the county of Columbia, and that they are desirous that said ferry should be established by law.

Therefore,

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That it shall and may be lawful for Daniel Montgomery and John Gearhart, their heirs and assigns, from and after the passing of this act, to make or cause to be made at their own proper cost and charge, good and convenient landings on their own land, on both sides of the North branch of Susquehanna, at and opposite to Danville, in the county of Columbia, for the purpose of a ferry; and shall at all times hereafter, maintain the same in good order and repair, fit for horses and carriages to pass and repass; and further the said Daniel Montgomery and John Gearhart, their heirs and assigns, shall provide and maintain a good and substantial boat or boats, and careful ferry-men, who shall duly and constantly, as occasion may require, attend for the purpose of transporting travellers over the said river; which ferry shall be subject to such rules, rates and regulations, as the court of quarter sessions of the county aforesaid may direct and appoint: *Provided always,* That nothing in this act contained, shall be construed to vest in Daniel Montgomery and John Gearhart, their heirs or assigns, any right to land any boat or boats upon any landing belonging to any other person or persons, without their consent being first had and obtained.
