AN ACT

For the relief of sandy soldiers and the widows of revolutionary soldiers.

AN ACT

Incorporating the town of Lawrenceville into a borough.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the town of Lawrenceville, in the county of Allegheny, shall be and the same is hereby erected into a borough, under the name and title of the borough of Lawrenceville, Name bounded and limited as follows : beginning at a large soft maple tree in front of Samuel Enult's land, where the township road strikes the Allegheny river, and thence south fifty-eight degrees, east two poles and two feet, including the township road, to a post ; thence south twenty-six degrees, west thirty-four poles and ten feet, to a post ; thence south eight degrees, east eleven and one fourth poles, to a post ; thence south forty-eight degrees, east one hundred and ninety-eight and a half poles, (crossing the Butler road at one hundred and four poles) to the Pittsburg and Greensburg turnpike road ; thence in the direction of said road south seventy-six and a half degrees, west one hundred and twenty-five and three fourth poles, (crossing Covington street at forty-three and three fourth poles, and Pike street at eighty-five and one fourth poles) to a post ; thence south forty-one degrees, west ninety-eight poles, to a large button wood tree, (a well known land mark) on the bank of the Two Mile run ; thence with the meanderings of the said run thirty-seven and three fourth poles, to the said turnpike road, where the turnpike bridge crosses said run ; thence north forty-four degrees, west ninety-six poles to a post at the foot of Wainwright's island, north twenty-nine degrees, east, including said island, two hundred and sixty-four poles, to the place of beginning.
