

mand, detain or receive more than three dollars for his agency, any contract, note or agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, under the penalty of forfeiting double the amount so charged or received, for the use of such soldier or widow, to be recovered as is provided in the preceding section.

SECTION 3. After the death of any pensioner, if any fractional part shall be due, the legal representative shall make due proof of the time of his demise, then the county treasurer shall pay him or them so much as shall appear to have been due at the time of his or her death. Fractional part to be paid to legal representatives.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the State Treasurer to furnish the county treasurers with a correct list of pensioners in each county, on or before the first day of June in every year, together with such as may hereafter be entitled to the same, with the amount due each and when and how payable; and if any pensioner shall remove into any other county of this State, he or she shall give notice to the State Treasurer of such removal, when the treasurer aforesaid shall notify such other county treasurer accordingly. State treasurer to furnish correct list of pensioners to co treasurers.

SECTION 5. If at any time when a pension becomes due, no State funds should be in the hands of a county treasurer and on application of any pensioner, the said treasurer shall furnish him or her with a certificate, certifying to the State Treasurer that he has no State funds at his disposal to pay said demand, then the payment shall be made at the Treasury department as if this act had not been passed. When no funds in co. treas'y, payment shall be made at the treasury department.

AN ACT

Authorizing the Wardens and Vestrymen of Saint James' Protestant Episcopal Church, in the borough of Bristol, to sell and convey a certain lot of land in said borough.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That John Bessonett and Robert Wright, wardens,*

and John Philips, William F. Swift, Eleazer Fenton, William Osmond, J. M. Hibbs, and H. N. Bostwick vestrymen of Saint James' Church, in the borough of Bristol, be, and they are hereby authorized to grant, bargain, and sell a certain lot or piece of ground, situate in said borough on the south western side of Mill street, bounded by lands of the estate of late Isaac Peace and John Johnson, being about fifty-five feet front on said street, and extending westerly sixty-three feet be the same more or less; and the said wardens and vestrymen, or a majority of them, are hereby authorized and empowered to execute a deed or deeds, in fee simple, to the purchaser or purchasers of the same or any part or parts thereof.

AN ACT

To authorize the guardians of the minor children of Henry Irwin, deceased, to convey certain real estate.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the guardians of the minor children of Henry Irwin, deceased, are hereby authorized to release and convey to the purchaser or purchasers at sheriff's sale, of the lots hereinafter described, the undivided interest, late the estate of John Irwin, deceased, in two certain lots in the city of Pittsburg, one thereof being the undivided moiety of lot number forty-three, in Wood's plan of the city of Pittsburg, bounded by Penn-street, by Barker alley, by lot number forty-four, and by the Allegheny river, being sixty feet in front on Penn-street, and extending in depth to the Allegheny river, on which are erected a double frame dwelling-house and other buildings; the other, being the undivided moiety of lot number one hundred and eighty-nine, in Wood's plan of the said city, bounded by Water-street, by lot number one hundred and eighty-eight, by Front-street, and by lot number one hundred and ninety, being sixty feet in front on Water-street, more or less, and extending
