

(e) Whitefish, less than one and three-fourths pounds in weight in the round.

*No person shall purchase, sell, or expose for sale, any blue pike or sauger pike, less than eleven inches in length in the round; or blue pike or sauger pike fillets, less than seven inches in length, dressed and cut out, caught in waters under the control of the Commonwealth, or in waters without this Commonwealth and received in interstate commerce, or otherwise.*

Any person violating the provisions of this section shall on conviction, as provided in chapter fourteen of this act, be subject to a penalty of ten dollars for each fish or fillet so taken, [or] had in possession, *purchased, sold, or offered for sale.*

The foregoing provisions of this section shall not apply to a person who, having caught any fish less than the size or weight permitted, returns such fish in the condition in which they were caught to the waters from which they were taken.

### AN ACT

To amend section five of the act, approved the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one (Pamphlet Laws, two hundred two), entitled "An act providing for the licensing and regulation of motor boats operated or navigated upon any public stream, artificial or natural body of water, or non-tidal waters of any river within the Commonwealth; conferring powers and imposing duties on certain police officers and the Board of Fish Commissioners, including the enforcement of certain existing laws; and prescribing penalties," as added, changing the licensure year for motor boats.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That section five of the act, approved the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-one (Pamphlet Laws, two hundred two), entitled "An act providing for the licensing and regulation of motor boats operated or navigated upon any public stream, artificial or natural body of water, or non-tidal waters of any river within the Commonwealth; conferring powers and imposing duties on certain police officers and the Board of Fish Commissioners, including the enforcement of certain existing laws; and prescribing penalties," as added thereto by the act, approved the thirty-first day of May, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three (Pamphlet Laws, one thousand one hundred twenty-two), is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 5. Dealers' and owners' license plates shall be valid from year to year provided the license is re-

newed as hereinafter required. If the license is not renewed, it shall be the duty of the motor boat owner to forward the license plates in his possession to the Department of Revenue, and remove the facsimile of such license plates, immediately upon the expiration of his license. In the event the license plates have been lost or destroyed, a sworn statement to that effect shall be submitted to the Department of Revenue in lieu of the license plates. Dealers' and owners' licenses, *issued for the calendar year one thousand nine hundred and thirty-five*, shall be valid until the [thirty-first day of December] *thirty-first day of* [next following the date of their issuance and] *May, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-six, and the license year thereafter shall be from the first day of June to the thirty-first day of May.* Licenses may be renewed from year to year upon application and payment of a fee as in the case of procurement of an original license.

When effective.

Section 2. This act shall become effective immediately upon final enactment.

### AN ACT

To amend section forty of the act, approved the second day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five (Pamphlet Laws, four hundred forty-eight), entitled "An act relating to fish; and amending, revising, consolidating, and changing the law relating to fish in the inland waters and the boundary lakes and boundary rivers of the Commonwealth," as amended changing the number of trout allowed to be caught in one day.

Section 40, act of May 2, 1925 (P. L. 448), as last amended by act of May 22, 1933 (P. L. 903), further amended.

Section 1. Be it enacted; &c., That section forty of the act, approved the second day of May, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-five (Pamphlet Laws, four hundred forty-eight), entitled "An act relating to fish; and amending, revising, consolidating, and changing the law relating to fish in the inland waters and the boundary lakes and boundary rivers of the Commonwealth," as last amended by the act, approved the twenty-second day of May, one thousand nine hundred and thirty-three (Pamphlet Laws, nine hundred three), is hereby further amended to read as follows:

Section 40. Number of Fish Which May Be Caught.—No person, except as in this article otherwise provided, shall, in any one day, catch, kill or have in possession more than the number of fish hereby designated for the respective species, that is to say:

(a) Charr, or trout of the combined species, [twenty] fifteen;
