

or any other substance which impairs the performance of his duties.

Section 7. Any person who violates any provision of this act or any rule or regulation thereunder shall, upon conviction thereof in a summary proceeding, be sentenced to pay a fine of one hundred dollars *(\$100). Penalty for violation.

Section 8. A person licensed under the provisions of this act engaged to draw blood samples from poultry to be used in pullorum testing shall not be an employe of the owner of the poultry. Restriction on employment.

Section 9. The act of April twenty-seven, one thousand nine hundred forty-five (Pamphlet Laws 321), known as "The Veterinary Law," is repealed in so far as it is inconsistent with this act. General repeal.

Section 10. This act shall take effect immediately. Act effective immediately.

AN ACT

Amending the act of August nine, one thousand nine hundred fifty-five (Pamphlet Laws 323), entitled "An act relating to counties of the third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth classes; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto," increasing the maximum appropriation which may be made for agricultural extension work.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: The County Code.

Section 1. Section one thousand nine hundred thirty-six, act of August nine, one thousand nine hundred fifty-five (Pamphlet Laws 323), known as "The County Code," is amended to read: Section 1936, act of August 9, 1955, P. L. 323, amended.

Section 1936. Agricultural Extension Work.—The board of commissioners may appropriate a sum not to exceed [twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000)] *fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000)* annually for agricultural extension work, in cooperation with the Pennsylvania State [College] *University*, in encouraging improved methods of farm management and home economics and giving practical instruction and demonstrations in agriculture, for the purpose of improving and developing the agricultural resources of the county. The money so appropriated shall be expended according to rules and regulations prescribed or approved by the board of

commissioners. The board of commissioners may also, where practicable and desirable, provide offices in the county court house for headquarters for such cooperative work.

Act effective immediately.

Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

AN ACT

Amending the act of April eleven, one thousand eight hundred ninety-nine (Pamphlet Laws 37), entitled "An act relating to the keepers of junk shops, and second hand dealers, in cities of this Commonwealth," making compliance with certain provisions evidence of innocence in prosecutions for receiving stolen goods.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 2, act of April 11, 1899, P. L. 37, amended.

Section 1. Section two, act of April eleven, one thousand eight hundred ninety-nine (Pamphlet Laws 37), entitled "An act relating to the keepers of junk shops, and second hand dealers, in cities of this Commonwealth," is amended to read:

In the English language.

To be open to inspection by police and detectives.

Section 2. Every owner of such junk shops and second hand stores shall provide and constantly keep a book, in which shall be fairly written down in the English language, at the time of every purchase of any such material, a description of all articles so purchased, the name and residence of the person from whom such purchase was made, and the day and hour of such purchase, and such books shall at all times be open to the inspection of any and every member of the police and detective forces of such city. *Compliance with the provisions of this section shall be evidence of the innocence of a junk shop keeper or second hand dealer of any crime of receiving stolen goods, notwithstanding the fact that the articles may in fact be stolen. Nothing contained in this section shall be interpreted as limiting, or interfering with, the title to, or right of, possession of the lawful owners of the articles.*
