

*respectively, exercise the rights and powers and perform the duties by law vested in and imposed upon them: Provided, however, That all certificates and official documents of such examining boards shall be issued by the Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs but may be signed by the members of the appropriate board, or any of them, as determined by such board.*

Section 3. Clauses (e), (g), (h), (i), (j), (k) and (l) of section 1304 and sections 1304.1 and 1310 of the act and their amendments are repealed.

Clauses (e), (g), (h), (i), (j), (k) and (l), section 1304 and sections 1304.1 and 1310 of the act as amended, repealed.

Section 4. (a) There are hereby transferred to the Department of State, to be used, employed and expended in connection with the functions, powers and duties, transferred by this act, the record, equipment and personnel now being used, held or employed in connection with such functions, powers and duties and the unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations and other funds available or to be made available for use in connection with such functions, powers or duties.

Transfer of record, equipment and personnel, and unexpended balances.

(b) The functions of the Superintendent of Public Instruction under sections 412, 413, 414, 415, 416, 418, 420, 421, 422, 425, 453, 459, 461, 462 and 464 of the act of April 9, 1929 (P. L. 177), known as "The Administrative Code of 1929," and its amendments, are transferred to, and shall be exercised by the Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs, and said sections are repealed in so far as they impose functions, powers and duties on the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Transfer of functions to Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs.

Section 5. All acts and parts of acts are repealed insofar as inconsistent.

General repeal.

Section 6. This act shall take effect July 1, 1963.

AN ACT

Amending the act of June 1, 1956 (P. L. 1959), entitled "An act fixing the salaries and compensation of the Chief Justice and judges of the Supreme Court, the President Judge and judges of the Superior Court, the judges of the courts of common pleas, the judges of the orphans' courts, the judges of the Municipal Court of Philadelphia and the judges of the County Court and Juvenile Court of Allegheny County, certain associate judges not learned in the law, certain state officers, and the salary and expenses of the members of the General Assembly, and repealing certain inconsistent acts," fixing the salary and compensation of the Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs.

**Judges.**

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows:

Section 13, act of June 1, 1956, P. L. 1956, amended.

Section 1. Section 13, act of June 1, 1956 (P. Salaries of Governor, Lieutenant Governor and heads of departments.

Section 13. Annual salaries of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and the heads of departments, shall be payable in equal semi-monthly installments, as follows:

Governor, thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000).

Lieutenant Governor, twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$22,500).

Secretary of the Commonwealth, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

*Commissioner of Professional and Occupational Affairs, fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).*

Attorney General, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Auditor General, twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$22,500).

State Treasurer, twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$22,500).

Secretary of Internal Affairs, twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars (\$22,500).

Superintendent of Public Instruction, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Adjutant General, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Insurance Commissioner, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Banking, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Agriculture, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Property and Supplies, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Forests and Waters, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Mines, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Highways, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Health, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Deputy Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State Police, thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500).

Secretary of Labor and Industry, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of *Public* Welfare, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Revenue, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Public Assistance, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Secretary of Commerce, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

Neither the Governor, Lieutenant Governor nor the head of any administrative department shall receive any additional compensation for any services rendered to the Commonwealth in any capacity.

Section 2. This act shall take effect July 1, 1963. Effective date.

AN ACT

Amending the act of May 1, 1933 (P. L. 103), entitled "An act concerning townships of the second class; and amending, revising, consolidating, and changing the law relating thereto," further regulating the compensation of township secretaries and treasurers.

The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania hereby enacts as follows: The Second Class Township Code.

Section 1. Section 531, act of May 1, 1933 (P. L. 103), known as "The Second Class Township Code," reenacted and amended July 10, 1947 (P. L. 1481) and amended June 1, 1956 (P. L. 2021), is amended to read: Section 531, act of May 1, 1933, P. L. 103, reenacted and amended July 10, 1947, P. L. 1481 and June 1, 1956, P. L. 2021, further amended.

Section 531. Compensation.—The township treasurer shall receive, as compensation for his services, *salary, wages or* a certain percentage on all moneys received and paid by him, which [rate] *compensation* shall be determined by the supervisors of the townships.
