CHAPTER XVI.

An ACT further to encourage the killing of Wolves.

Section 1. **D**E it enacted by the Senate and D House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the The proof necessary to entipassing of this act, any person or persons, who tle, and the reshall kill any wolf or wolves, within the bounds ward given for of any county within this commonwealth, and killing wolves. who shall produce the head or heads thereof, before any justice of the peace in and for any county as aforefaid, it shall be the duty of such justice, to examine such person or persons, on oath or affirmation, touching the time when, and place where fuch wolf or wolves was or were caught and killed; and if the place of fuch catching and killing shall be found to be within the bounds of the county in which fuch justice has jurisdiction, and if the wolf be full grown, it then shall be the duty of such justice, after destroying such head or heads, to give fuch person or persons a certificate thereof, and to fign an order for eight dollars, on the treafurer of the county in which it shall have appeared fuch wolf or wolves was or were caught and killed, for each and every head produced and destroyed as before mentioned; and for every wolf-puppy that shall be produced and destroyed as before mentioned, he shall fign an order on the treasurer atoresaid, for the sum of two dollars fifty cents: and it shall be the duty of fuch treasurer, and he is hereby di-The fund derected to pay the amount of the faid order, fignated out of out of the money in the treasury appropriated which it is to for county purposes.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That so much of the act, entitled "An Act more effectually to encourage hereby altered." the killing of wolves," passed the thirteenth of April, one thousand seven hundred and eightytwo, as is hereby altered or amended, is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That this act shall be and continue in force for three years, and from thence to the end of the next session of the general affembly.
