Sec. 2. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That so much of the act, entitled "An Act more effectually to encourage hereby altered." the killing of wolves," passed the thirteenth of April, one thousand seven hundred and eightytwo, as is hereby altered or amended, is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That this act shall be and continue in force for three years, and from thence to the end of the next session of the general affembly.

## CHAPTER XVII.

An ACT to authorife the fale of the estate of Catharine Erringer, a lunatic, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

HEREAS, it appears by an inquisition taken at the alms-house, in the county of Philadelphia, on the twenty-first day of September, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-five, by virtue of a commission of lunacy, un-

der the seal of the court of common pleas, for the faid county, that Catharine Erringer was, at the time of taking faid inquisition, a lunatic: And whereas, it has been represented to the legislature, by the petition of Frederick Erringer, of the city of Philadelphia, and of the guardians of the poor in the faid city, that the faid Catharine Erringer, fifter of the faid Frederick, for feveral years last past, hath been, and still is, a charge to the faid city and liberties; and that she is seized in fee, of one undivided fixth part of a certain three story brick house, and lot or piece of ground thereto belonging, fituate on the east side of Delaware Third-street, continued a little to the northward of Callowhill-street, in the Northern-Liberties of the faid city; late the estate of her father, Jacob Erringer, deceased, which property the petitioners conceive ought to be applied to her support; but inasmuch as the faid Catharine is a lunatic, and incapable of disposing of the same, the said petitioners have prayed that the legislature would be pleased to authorife the sale of the share of the said Catharine, in the premifes, and that the monies arifing therefrom, may be applied towards her support: Therefore,

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwcalth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Peter Browne empowered to Peter Browne, of the township of the Northern-fell the clate Liberties, in the county of Philadelphia, esquire, of C. Erringer. be, and he is hereby authorifed and empowered to fell and convey the share and estate of the faid Catharine Erringer, of and in the faid house and lot or piece of ground, to such perfon or persons, for such price or prices, and on fuch terms and conditions as he may deem most advantageous

advantageous to the parties concerned; and that the conveyance to be made by him, shall be as good and effectual in law, to all intents and purposes, as if the faid Catharine Erringer was of sound mind, and a party to the said conveyance; but shall have no greater or other force or effect whatsoever.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted by the auPurchase mo- thority aforesaid, That the monies arising from

The fall be applied to the maintenance

that the same shall be duly paid over to the guardians of the poor, in the city of Philadelphia,
