CHAPTER XVIII.

An ACT to direct the manner, time and places, of holding elections for Electors of President and Vice-President of the United States.

WHEREAS, the conftitution of the United States directs, That for the purpose of choosing a president and vice-president of the United United States, "Each state shall appoint in fuch manner, as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the state may be entitled in the congress:" Therefore,

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Places where, an election shall be held in the city of Philadel-election for phia, and the feveral counties of this common-prefident and wealth, by the citizens qualified to vote for of the U.S. to members of the general affembly, at the same be he'd and by places at which the faid members shall have whom. been voted for at the last preceding election, on the fifth Friday, preceding the first Wednefday in December, which will be in the year one thousand eight hundred and four, and on the fifth Friday preceding the first Wednesday in December in every fourth year thereafter, for the purpose of electing electors of a president and vice-prefident of the United States; of which elections due notice shall be given by the sheriss of the respective counties, and the feveral judges, infpectors and clerks, who shall have attended at the last election for members of the general affembly, shall attend and perform at the said election of electors, the like duties, and be subject to the like penalties for neglect or misconduct, as they are or shall be liable to, at the election of members of the general affembly.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted by the authority aforefaid, That at every fuch election, Who may vote every citizen qualified as aforefaid, shall be en-voting. titled to vote by delivering to the proper officer, a written

a written or printed ticket or ballot, containing the names of a number of persons, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives, to which this state may be entitled in congress of the United States; and the same proceeding shall be had with the said tickets, as is or shall be by law directed, at the election of

An ACT declaring the holding of offices or appointments under this State, incompatible with the holding or exercifing offices or appointments under the United States.

HEREAS, the eighth fection of the fecond article of the conflitution of this commonwealth, provides that no perfon holding or exercifing
