An ACT to facilitate the fettlement of the ac-counts of the former and present county Treasurers for arrears of State taxes.

DE it enacted by the Senate and Section 1. and present county treasurers, for the arrears of Agents duties, state taxes; which agent or agents shall, as soon as conveniently may be, attend in those counties where the faid comptroller and register-general shall deem necessary, which are in arrears in the payment of state taxes, and shall proceed to examine and adjust the faid accounts of the former and present county treasurers, well for ascertaining the amounts affessed, levied and collected, as in whose hands any balance remains; and it shall be the duty of the comptroller and register-generals, at least twenty days previous to the time of fuch agent or agents coming into any county where fuch accounts are to be adjusted, to give notice thereof to the faid treasurers; and if on demand made by the glecting or re- faid agent or agents, the treasurers, commissioners or auditors, for auditing, fettling and adjusting the public accounts of county treasurers and commissioners, shall neglect or refuse to produce and exhibit any of their books, accounts or papers, by them kept, as county treasurers, commissioners or auditors, as aforesaid, for every fuch neglect or refusal of the said county treafurers, commissioners or auditors, they shall, on conviction thereof in any court of record of this commonwealth, feverally forfeit and pay to the treasurer of the state, for the use thereof, any fum not less than three hundred, nor more than one thousand dollars, at the discretion of the court before whom fuch conviction had.

Penalty on treafurers nefuling to exhibit their books and papers.

Agents to be furnished with the necessary documents.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the comptroller register-generals, shall, on or before the first day of May next, furnish the faid agent or agents, with certified copies of all the documents in their their respective offices, which they shall judge necessary, to enable him or them to execute the duties by this act enjoined; and when so furnished with the copies aforesaid, the said agent or agents shall proceed, at such time, and to such counties as the said comptroller and register-generals shall direct.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted by the authority aforefaid, That the agent or agents ap-Their powers, pointed, as aforefaid, when performing the duties enjoined by this act, shall have like powers with which the comptroller and register-generals, are invested, by the laws of this commonwealth, so far as relates to the adjusting the accounts aforefaid.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted by the authority aforefaid, That all fettlements made by Effect of fetvirtue of this act, shall have like effect, and be by virtue of subject to like appeals and restrictions, as are this act. provided by the act, entitled "An Act to pro-"vide for the settlement of public accounts, and for other purposes therein mentioned," passed the fourth day of April, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-two.

An ACT to prescribe the times, places and manner, of choosing Senators, to represent this State in the Senate of the United States.
