CHAPTER XXIV.

An ACT for the relief of John Berrell.

WHEREAS, it has been represented to the legislature that John Tyson, late of the township of Abington, county of Montgomery, and state of Pennsylvania, deceased, being in his life time, seized in his demesne, as of see, of and in a certain lot of land, situate in the township of Abington aforesaid, containing about sixteen acres of land, did by parole contract, agree to sell and convey the same to John Berrell, of the township of Abington aforesaid, in see, for a valuable consideration, which consideration has been paid by the said John Berrell, but

but the faid John Tyson died before a deed of conveyance was executed for the faid lot of land: And whereas, it appears to the legislature, that Isaac Tyson and Thomas Tyson, executors of the last will and testament of the said John Tylon, deceased, are willing and desirous that a law should be passed to authorise them to convey the faid lot of land to the faid John Berrell, his heirs and assigns, conformably to the said parole contract; and as relief cannot be had under any existing law of this commonwealth: Therefore.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is of J. Tyson de hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That cealed empow- it shall and may be lawful for Isaac Tyson and ered to convey Thomas Tylon, executors of the last will and to J. Berrell a testament of John Tyson, deceased, by leave of lot of ground in Montgome the court of common pleas for the county of Montgomery, upon fuch reasonable notice being given, as the faid court shall direct, to all perfons interested, to make and execute a decd to John Berrell, his heirs and affigns, for a certain lot or piece of land, fituate in the township of Abington and county of Montgomery, beginning at a white-oak stump, in the line of Samuel Shoemaker's land; thence by David Krier's land, fouth forty-eight degrees forty-five minutes east, fixty-three perches and a quarter of a perch, to a corner stone; thence by John Thaw's land, north forty-one degrees and forty minutes east, twenty-two perches and forty-five one hundredths of a perch, to a corner stone; thence fouth forty-eight degrees forty-five minutes east, seven perches and sisteen one hundredths of a perch to a corner stone; thence north forty-one degrees and forty minutes east, fifteen

fifteen perches and a quarter of a perch, to a corner stone; thence by John Hobensack's land, north forty-eight degrees forty-five minutes west, feventy perches and four tenths of a perch, to a corner stone; thence by the said Samuel Shoemaker's land, fouth forty-one degrees and forty minutes west, thirty-eight perches and ninetenths of a perch, to the place of beginning, containing fixteen acres and eleven perches of land; which deed shall be as good and available, to all intents and purpofes, as if the fame had been executed in purfuance of the powers given to the courts of judicature, by the act, entitled "An Act to enable executors and admini-" itrators, by leave of court, to convey lands and " tenements contracted for with their decedents, and for other purpofes therein mentioned," passed the thirty-first day of March, one thousand feven hundred and ninety-two: Provided always, That nothing herein contained, shall be deemed or construed to bar or defeat any other person or persons, bodies politic or corporate, of any right, title, interest, claim or demand, which they may have, in, or to the faid lot or piece of land, or any part thereof.
