

CHAPTER LIII.

An ACT to enable General John Steele and William Calhoun, to sell and convey a certain tract of land therein mentioned.

Section 1. **B**E it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That general John Steele and William Calhoun, or either of them, be, and they are hereby authorized to sell and convey, on such terms, for such consideration, and to such person or persons as they shall deem proper, just and right, and most beneficial to the inhabitants of Drumore township, in the county of Lancaster, all that certain tract or parcel of land, situate in the township aforesaid, containing about one hundred acres, more or less, and which was conveyed by Bryan Quin, by deed, dated twenty-sixth December, one thousand seven hundred and sixty-seven, to Robert Long and Samuel M^cConnel, then overseers of the poor of said township, and their successors in office forever, after the death of said Bryan Quin; and the monies arising from the sale thereof, shall be applied towards reimbursing the said township for the expence necessarily incurred by them in supporting the said Bryan Quin and his children.

General Steele & Wm. Calhoun empowered to sell and convey a tract of land in Drumore township Lancastercounty, for the use of said township.
