CHAPTER LXXXI.

An ACT to authorife Marcus Hulings, to erect a toll-bridge over French creek, opposite Turkeyftreet, in the town of Franklin.

Section 1. PE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is bereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be lings and his lawful for Marcus Hulings, his heirs and assigns, heirs authorist to erect, build, maintain and support a good ed to build a bridge over and substantial bridge, over and across French creek creek, opposite Turkey-street, in the town of in the town of Franklin, in Venango county; and the property of said bridge, when built, shall be, and the same is hereby vested in the said Marcus Hulings, his heirs and assigns for ever; and the said Marcus Hulings, his heirs and assigns, may demand and receive toll from travellers and

and others, not exceeding the following rates,

and demand certain fpccified tolls.

viz. For every coach, landau, chariot, phæton, or other pleafurable carriage, ten cents for each horse drawing the same; for every loaded waggon or cart, ten cents for each horse drawing the fame; and for every empty waggon or cart, eight cents for each horse drawing the same; for every fleigh or fled, fix cents for each horse drawing the same; for a fingle horse and rider, fix cents; for every horse, four cents; for every foot passenger, one cent; for every head of horned cattle, two cents; for sheep or swine, at the rate of ten cents for every fcore; and all carriages which shall be drawn by oxen, or partly by oxen and partly by horses, two oxen shall be estimated as equal to one horse: vided always nevertheless, That nothing in this not be erected act contained, shall extend to authorise the said Marcus Hulings, or any other person, to erect property, with-out the owners a bridge in the manner in this act before menleave, nor so as tioned, on any private property, without the confent of the owners thereof, or to erect the same in fuch manner as in any way to interfere with, injure, or obstruct the navigation of the said creek, or the passage over the ford across the fame near where the faid bridge may be erected.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That if the said Marcus Hu-The time with- lings, his heirs and affigns, shall not proceed to in which the bridge is to be carry on the faid work within one year after the built, limited, passing of this act, or shall not within three years complete the same, according to the true intent and meaning of this act, or if at any time after the faid bridge is completed, it is fuffered to be out of repair, fo as to be impassible for horses and waggons for the space of twelve months, then and in either of those cases, all and singular the rights, liberties, privileges and franchifes hereby

hereby granted to the faid Marcus Hulings, his heirs and assigns, shall revert to this commonwealth.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That if the said Marcus Hu-Penalty for not lings, his heirs and affigns, shall neglect to keep keeping faid bridge in good the faid bridge in good and perfect order and re-repair. pair, for the space of five days, and information thereof shall be given to any justice of the peace of the county, fuch justice shall issue his precepts, directed to any conftable, commanding him to fummon three judicious freeholders to meet at a certain time, in the said precepts to be mentioned, at the faid bridge, of which faid meeting notice shall be given to the faid Marcus Hulings, his heirs or affigns; and the faid justice shall at such time and place, by the oaths or affirmations of the faid freeholders, enquire whether the faid bridge is in good and perfect order and repair as aforefaid, and if the faid bridge shall be found by the faid inquisition not to be in good order and repair, according to the true intent and meaning of this act, he shall certify the same, and fend a copy of the inquisition to the said Marcus Hulings, his heirs or affigns, and from thenceforth the faid tolls hereby granted, shall cease to be demanded, paid, or collected, until the defective part or parts of the faid bridge shall be put in good and perfect order and repair as aforefaid.
