Section 1. CHAPTER XCII.

An ACT to enable purchasers at Sheriff's or Coroner's sales to obtain possession.

HEREAS, great inconveniences have been experienced from the unjust detention of lands and tenements fold by sheriffs under executions from the several courts of this commonwealth, the purchasers whereof have been obliged to bring ejectments, and to subject themselves to all the delays and expences incident to law proceedings, to recover the possession from the person as whose property the same was originally sold, the desperate circumstances of whom usually preclude the possibility of obtaining damages or any other compensation whatever, for such unjust detention: For remedy whereof,

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania,
