CHAPTER CXXXII.

An ACT to erect a new election district in the county of Dauphin, and to alter the place of holding the general elections for the two adjoining districts.

Section 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the following boundaries shall compose an election district, to district erected wit: Beginning at the west side of Susquehanin Dauphin county; na river, opposite the end of Peter's mountain; its houndaries, thence across the said river, and along the top of said mountain to the line of Berks county; thence along said line to the top of Wisconesco Vol. V. 3 B or
