VI.

RESOLVED *by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met,* That the commissioners of the counties of Huntingdon, Cambria, Indiana, Armstrong, Butler, Beaver and Mercer, into whose hands an appropriation of money made during this session, by an act, entitled, "An Act making appropriations for the improvement of certain roads," is to be placed for improving the State road, laid out in pursuance of an act, passed the fourth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and five, from Blair's gap, in Huntingdon county, through their respective counties aforesaid, to the western boundary of the State, are hereby authorized and required to lay out the sums appropriated to their respective counties, for opening and improving said road, and the commissioners of the respective counties shall be allowed the sum of one dollar and thirty-three cents for each day, they shall be necessarily employed in the service of having the respective sums granted to the counties aforesaid, well and faithfully expended, and to be paid out of the county stock of the respective counties, and lay their accounts before the auditors of their respective counties, to be by them settled as accounts of like nature are by law directed to be settled.
