CHAPTER I.

An Act SUPPLEMENTARY to an act, entitled " An act to raise by way of lottery the sum of seven thousand dollars, to enable the company for the purpose of promoting the cultivation of Vines, to pay their debts and accomplish the object of their association, and two thousand dollars for erecting a school house near Summonytown, in Montgomery county.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the legislature by the president and managers of the company for promoting the cultivation of Vines in Pennsylvania, that Richard Smith, Major Anthony Simmonds, John Goodwin, Peter Christian, Robert Bethel, Benjamin S. Barton, M. D. and James Vanuxem, the commissioners named in an act of the legislature of this state, bearing date the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and six, for the purpose of raising by way of lottery, seven thousand dollars, have declined the duty enjoined on them by the aforesaid act: For remedy whereof,

SECT. I. any of them refuse to take upon themselves the duties enjoined by the act aforesaid, then, and in that case the governor shall be, and he is hereby empowered to fill such vacancy.
