

CHAPTER LXXIX.

An ACT to repeal an act, entitled "An act establishing an auction store in the borough of Lancaster."

WHEREAS a number of the inhabitants of the borough and county of Lancaster, have represented that the law passed the twenty-sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eight, establishing an auction store in said borough, does not answer the end for which it was intended, but is inconvenient, unnecessary and burthensome, and have prayed that the same may be repealed: Therefore,

Law establishing an auction store in the borough of Lancaster repealed.

SECTION I *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the law passed the twenty-sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eight, establishing an auction store in the borough of Lancaster be, and the same is hereby repealed,*

 CHAPTER LXXX.

An ACT authorizing William Lane and Thomas Davis, to build a bridge across the Raystown Branch of Juniata, near the mouth of Yellow Creek.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,*

Wm. Lane and Tho. Davis authorized to erect and maintain a bridge across the Juniata river. Proviso.

That it shall and may be lawful for William Lane and Thomas Davis, their heirs and assigns, to erect and build; maintain, and support a good and substantial bridge over and across Juniata, at or near the mouth of Yellow Creek: Provided nevertheless, That nothing in this act shall be taken or construed so as to prevent any person from crossing the said branch of Juniata, by fording, or to impede the navigation thereof; and no obstructions shall be erected by the said William Lane and Thomas Davis, their heirs or assigns, for the prevention of the same.

The property of said bridge to be vested in said Wm. Lane and Thomas Davis and their heirs, &c.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the property of the aforesaid bridge when built, shall be, and the same is hereby vested in the said William Lane and Thomas Davis, their heirs and assigns, and that the said William Lane and Thomas Davis, their heirs and assigns shall, and may demand and receive toll from travellers and others, according to*

the following rates, *viz.* Every four-wheeled waggon or carriage with four or more horses twenty-five cents; each waggon or carriage with two horses twenty cents; a sled or cart with two horses twelve cents; a man and horse six cents; each footman one cent.

And may demand and receive toll. Rates of toll to be received.

SECT. III. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the militia on days of training, or of military procession, or persons attending funerals, shall have the privilege of passing and repassing the said bridge toll free.

CHAPTER LXXXI.

An ACT granting to certain patentees in Luzerne county further time to record their patents.

SECTION I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same* That all persons who have obtained patents in the fifteen townships in Luzerne county, and who have not procured a record thereof, to be made according to the provisions of the second section of an act entitled a further supplement to the act, entitled “An act for offering compensation to the Pennsylvania claimants, of certain lands within the seventeen townships in the county of Luzerne, and for other purposes therein mentioned,” passed April fourth, one thousand eight hundred and five, are hereby allowed ninety days from the passing of this act to procure such record to be made; and all patents recorded as aforesaid, within the said ninety-days, shall be good and effectual in law to all intents and purposes, as though they had been recorded within the time prescribed by the aforesaid act.

Further time granted to certain persons for enrolling their patents.
