CHAPTER LXI.

An ACT appropriating a sum of money for improving the road from Pittsburgh, through Canonsburg, to the town of Washington, in the county of Washington.

SECT. I. *BE* it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the sum of fifteen hundred dollars be, and the same is hereby appropriated for the purpose of improving the road from the Monongahela river, opposite the town of Pittsburgh, by the way of the Coal-Hill in Allegheny county, through Canonsburg to Washington, in Washington county.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That at any time after the passage of this act, the state treasurer be, and he hereby is authorized and directed to pay the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars to the commissioners of the county of Allegheny, which sum the said commissioners are required to expend on that part of said road, for the improvement thereof, which lies within the county of Allegheny.

SECT. III. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That at any time after the passage of this act, the state treasurer be, and he hereby is authorized and directed to pay the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars to the commissioners of the county of Washington, which sum the commissioners are required to expend on that part of the road aforesaid, which lies between the town of Washington and the line which divides the counties of Washington and Allegheny.

CHAPTER LXII.

An ACT to authorize the commissioners of Armstrong county, to sell certain lots in the town of Kittaning, and to purchase other ground in lieu thereof.

WHEREAS James Armstrong, formerly the owner of the land whereon the town of Kittaning is erected, appropriated four lots of ground numbered in the general plan of said town, sixty-one, sixty-seven, seventy-three, and seventy-nine, adjoining each other, and forming a square, to be occupied as a public burial ground: And whereas the inhabitants of said town have represented to the legislature, that should the said ground be occupied as originally contemplated, the water with which they are supplied, would be materially adulterated, owing to the sandiness of the soil, and the elevated situation of the said lots: Therefore,

SECTION I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the commissioners of Armstrong county be, and they hereby are authorized and empowered, having first given four weeks public notice in the Farmer's Register, printed in Greensburgh, in the county of Westmoreland, in one of the newspapers printed in Pittsburgh, and by written or printed advertisements put up at six of the most public places in the county of Armstrong, one of which shall be on the court-house door, in the town of Kittaning, of the time and place of sale, to proceed to sell by public vendue, four lots of ground numbered in the general plan of the town of Kittaning, sixty-one, sixty-seven, seventy-three, seventy-nine, for the highest and best price that can be had for the same, and upon payment of the purchase money, to execute a deed or deeds to the purchaser or purchasers: And the said commissioners shall immediately apply the money arising from such sale or sales, to the purchase of other ground in a situation more eligible to be occupied as a public burial-ground for the inhabitants of the town of Kittaning, and its vicinity, which shall forever be taken and considered in lieu of the lots sold as aforesaid.*
