CHAPTER LXXXIV.

An ACT authorizing John Baird, Hugh Baird, and Samuel Adams, executors of the last will and testament of John Baird, deceased, to

make a title for a certain tract of land, therein mentioned.

TX HEREAS, it appears that John Baird, late of Beaver county, deceased, did in his life-time, sell to a certain James Mc. Kee for the consideration of four hundred and fifty dollars, four hundred and ten dollars of which, was paid to said John Baird, a certain tract of donation land, in district number one, containing two hundred acres, it being lot number sixty-eight; but as there was no written agreement between the parties, consequently the existing laws on the subject gives no authority to the court, to complete the title to the land aforesaid: Therefore,

SECTION I. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennyslvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the executors aforesaid, be, and they are hereby empowered sosoon as the said James Mc.Kee shall fully comply with the verbal agreement aforesaid, to make and execute to the said James to execute a Mc Kee, a deed of conveyance for all the right, title, estate and interest, that the said John Baird had in his lifetime, to the tract of land aforesaid, which deed shall vest the title in the said Mc.Kee, as fully as if the said John Baird had conveyed the same in his lifetime to the said James Mc.Kee.

CHAPTER LXXXV.

An ACT authorizing William Liggins to receive a patent for a do-

nation tract of land in trust for Mary his wife.

HEREAS it has been made appear to the legislature, that Thomas Davis enlisted as a soldier in Colonel Moses Hazen's regiment, early in the revolutionary war: That he died of the wounds he received by the bursting of a shell at the siege of Yorktown, and that he left a widow who has since intermarried with William Liggins, now with his wife resident in the State of Ohio, who has petitioned the legislature to be allowed to receive a patent for a donation tract of land, to which his wife is in equity entitled: Therefore,

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is bereby enacted by the authority of the same, A patent for That the land-officers, be, and they are hereby directed to issue tract of land a patent for two hundred acres of donation land to the said William Liggins, in trust for the use of Mary his wife, late Mary Davis, her heirs and assigns in the usual manner.

CHAPTER LXXXVI.

An ACT to regulate the Fisheries in the River Delaware, and for other purposes.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in compliance with the request of the honourable the degislature of the State of New-Jersey, the Supplement enacted by them, dated November twentieth one thousand eight hundred and nine, to prolong the time for catching shad below the River Lehigh, to the Falls of Trenton, until the fifteenth day of No shad to June; and above the River Lehigh to the station point, until be caught in the twentieth day of June, is hereby ratified and confirmed, and shall be as valid within this commonwealth, as if it had been renacted section by section, and shall be printed and annexed, as in certain other laws of this state usually are, and shall go immediately into periods. operation.

STATE OF NEW-JERSEY.

An ACT supplementary to the act, entitled an act to regulate the fisheries in the river Delaware, and for other purposes," passed November 26th, 1808.

1. Be it enacted by the Council and General Assembly of this state, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall be lawful to make use of shad seines, or shad nets, for the purpose of catching fish in the river Delaware, within the limits of this state, between the foot of the falls of Trenton, and opposite the mouth of the river Lehigh, until the fifteenth day of June, and between the mouth of the river Lehigh, and the Station Point, or north west corner of this state, until the twentieth day of June in each and every year, subject in all cases, to the same regulations, fines and penalties, pointed out in the act to which this is a supplement.
