RESOLUTIONS.

CHAPTER I.

Suits to be brought against the managers of the Susquehanna and Perkioming bridge lottery.

RESOLVED, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the governor be, and he hereby is authorized and required to cause suits to be brought on the official bonds of the managers named in the act entitled, "An Act for raising, by way of lottery, the sum of twenty thousand dollars, for removing the obstructions and improving the navigation of the river Susquehanna, and certain branches thereof," or in the supplement to the said act passed thirty-first March, one thousand eight hundred and six, who shall appear to have acted as such managers, and to have received any tickets for distribution, for which they have not yet accounted and settled; and of the commissioners appointed under an act entitled, "An Act for raising by way of lottery, the sum of twenty thousand dollars, to be applied to the erection of a stone arch bridge over Perkioming creek, in the county of Montgomery, on the road leading from Philadelphia to the borough of Reading," passed the 21st of February, 1797.

CHAPTER II.
