SECT. III. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That no member of either branch of the legislature of this commonwealth, shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, hold any other office or appointment within this commonwealth, to which perquisites or fees are attached under the constitution, or any law, except in the militia, attorney at law, or elective offices and appointments, by the people, and by courts of justice,

CHAPTER LVIII.

*A SUPPLEMENT to the act, entitled "An act to incorporate the Lancaster and Susquehanna Insurance Company."*

Charter extended.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the charter of the Lancaster and Susquehanna insurance company, be, and the same is hereby extended, and continued in force, until the second Monday in December, which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two, and no longer, being an extension of six years, with the powers and restrictions contained in the original charter.

Company incorporated.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the subscribers to the Lancaster and Susquehanna insurance company, their successors and assigns, are hereby ordained, constituted, and declared to be, forever hereafter, a body politic and corporate, in law, and in fact, for the purpose of making insurances from loss by fire; and by the name of "The Lancaster and Susquehanna insurance company;" they and their successors shall, and may, have continual succession; and shall have, hold, possess and enjoy, all and singular, the powers, rights, immunities, and privileges, granted to other fire insurance companies, within this commonwealth; and shall be subject to the like restrictions; *provided always,* that if at any time it shall appear to the legislature, that the charter privileges, hereby granted, are injurious to the public

welfare, the power thereof, to repeal this act or any part of it, shall not on any conditions be denied, or impaired, but such repeal shall not affect any engagement to which said company may become a party previously thereto.

### CHAPTER LIX.

An ACT to erect the towns of Waterford and New-Haven, in the county of Lancaster, into a borough.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the towns of Waterford and New-Haven, in the county of Lancaster, shall be, and the same are hereby erected, into a borough, which shall be called "MARIETTA," which borough shall be comprised within the following boundaries, to wit; beginning at a post at the river Susquehanna; thence extending along the line of lands of James Anderson, and the late Samuel Evans, deceased, north, twenty-seven degrees and a quarter, east one hundred and thirty-six perches, to a post; thence along the lands of James Anderson, Anthony Haines, David Cook, and Henry Cassel, north seventy-eight degrees and a quarter, east three hundred and twenty-four perches, to a post; thence down the lands of the said Henry Cassel, south two degrees and three quarters east, one hundred and eight perches to the river Susquehanna aforesaid, at a corner of land of said Henry Cassel and Christian Hershey; thence up the said river on the several courses thereof, three hundred and ninety perches, to the place of beginning.

SECT. II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That it shall and may be lawful for all persons, entitled to vote for members of the legislature, who have resided in the said borough, twelve months previously to such election, to meet at the school-house, in the said borough, (or at such other place as may hereafter be appointed,) on the second Tuesday of April, in every year; and then and there elect by ballot, between the hours of twelve and six o'clock of the same day, one reputable freeholder residing therein, who shall be styled "The burgess of said borough," and five reputable freeholders residing therein, who shall be a town council; and shall also elect as aforesaid, one reputable freeholder, a high constable; but previously to such election, the inhabitants shall
