

CHAPTER CXX.

An ACT to improve the breed of sheep, in the counties of Luzerne, Northumberland, and Delaware.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That no ram shall be permitted to run at large in the counties of Luzerne, Northumberland, and Delaware, between the first day of August and the first day of December, under the penalty of two dollars, to be recovered from the owner of such ram, as debts of equal amount are now recoverable in this commonwealth, and unless the said penalty be paid within three days after demand is made by the person taking up the same; *Provided always,* that before demand is made as aforesaid, three days previous notice shall be given at ten of the most public places in the township where such ram was taken; and if no owner can be found in twenty days after such notice, as aforesaid, the ram shall be forfeited, and become the property of the then possessor.

Rams not to be permitted to run at large during certain seasons.
Penalty.
How recoverable.
Notice to be given.
Where no owner appears, the ram may be forfeited.

CHAPTER CXXI.

An ACT granting to Charles Martin, a tract of donation land.

WHEREAS it appears that Charles Martin enlisted in the year one thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, a sergeant-major in the Pennsylvania line, and continued therein, till the year one thousand seven hundred and eighty-one, when he was drafted and attached to general Armang's legionary corps, where he remained until discharged at the close of the war, in one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, and having never received that donation land which his service entitled him to: Therefore,

SECT. 1. *Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the proper officers shall place Charles Martin on the list of soldiers, entitled to donation lands, and on his application, by himself, or his attorney duly constituted, shall draw, and patent to

him, such donation lands, as his services and rank in the army entitle him to.

CHAPTER CXXII.

An ACT for the immediate relief of Emanuel Bollinger and Valentine Weirick.

WHEREAS it appears that Emanuel Bollinger and Valentine Weirick, in the county of Dauphin, were enlisted as private soldiers in captain Matthew Smith's company, in the first Pennsylvania regiment, which marched from Lancaster county to Boston in the year one thousand seven hundred and seventy-five, and from thence marched under the command of general Benedict Arnold, to Quebec, during which period they suffered great hardships and had to support themselves for about seven months, for which support they have not received any remuneration: Therefore,

SECT. I. *Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Emanuel Bollinger be, and he is hereby allowed the sum of forty dollars; and Valentine Weirick be, and he is hereby allowed the sum of sixty dollars, to be in full for rations respectively furnished by themselves, whilst on an expedition against the British at Quebec, to be paid to them respectively, or their attorneys, by the state-treasurer, immediately after the passing of this act.*
