CHAPTER CLIII.

An ACT providing for the payment of such portion of a direct tax as may be laid by the general government, on this commonwealth.

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in case congress should think proper to lay a direct tax, the loan to be negovernor is hereby authorized and required to negociate a gociated by loan, with all or any of the incorporated banks, within this the Governor. commonwealth, in the stock of which this state have an interest or elsewhere: Provided, the same can be had at an interest not exceeding six per cent, for such portion of said tax as shall be called for, for the year one thousand eight hundred and twelve from this commonwealth, and the same to pay over in such manner as congress may direct.
