missioners therein named, to dispose of the powder magazine and lot of ground in the city of Philadelphia, and with the proceeds thereof to purchase some other more convenient site to erect a new magazine thereon: and whereas the said commissioners. agreeably to the provisions of the said act, did sell the same and purchase another lot of ground for the purpose contemplated by the said act, but finding that the funds were not sufficient for its completion, they applied to the legislature for a sum of money to discharge the whole of the expenses incurred, which was granted; but on the settlement of the accounts of Matthew Shaw, deceased, one of the commissioners therein named, it appeared that there was still due to him, a balance of six hundred and forty-six dollars ninety-four cents; and whereas it appears reasonable that the said debt should be discharged: Therefore,

SECT. 1. Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That to be paid to the the superintendant or keeper of the powder magazine, the pro-keepe rof thema-gazine. perty of the state, in the county of Philadelphia, shall be, and he is hereby authorized and required to demand and receive of and from the private owner or possessors of all gunpowder deposited or stored in the said magazine, in addition to the sums now paid six cents for every cask of powder so deposited or stored, as specified by the seventh section of the act, entitled, " An act for securing the city of Philadelphia and the neighbourhood thereof from damage by gunpowder;" and the money arising therefrom How to be applishall be applied by the said superintendant or keeper, in discharg- ed. ing the balance due the said Matthew Shaw, deceased, or his legal representatives, with interest; which money shall be paid in quarterly payments: provided, that when the said debt shall be provise. discharged the rate of storage shall be as heretofore.
