CHAPTER XL.

An ACT for the relief of Arthur St. Clair.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the state treasurer be and he is hereby required to pay unto Arthur St. Clair, late a major general in the revolutionary war, or to his order, the sum of two hundred dollars immediately, and an annuity of two hundred dollars, to commence the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and thirteen, to be paid half yearly during his life.*

CHAPTER XLI.

An ACT to alter the time of holding several of the courts of quarter sessions and common pleas, in the third judicial district or circuit.

SECT. 1. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the first Monday in March next, the courts of quarter sessions and common pleas, in the third judicial district or circuit, shall commence and be holden on the following days in each and every year, to wit: in the county of Schuylkill, on the last Mondays in March, July, October, and December; in the county of Berks, on the Mondays succeeding the commencement of the courts in Schuylkill*

CHAPTER XLII.

An ACT for the relief of George Nagle.

WHEREAS John M'Nair of Allen township, in the county of Northampton, and commonwealth of Pennsylvania, on the twenty-fourth day of September, one thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine, purchased at public sale, of the agents appointed for the sale of confiscated estates, a tract of one hundred and eighty nine acres and ninety-nine perches, situate in Allen township aforesaid, as the estate of Andrew Allen, which tract of land has by lawful conveyance been since vested in George Nagle : *and whereas*, the said George Nagle, was in October, one thousand eight hundred and nine, by due course of law, evicted from the said premises, by a title paramount in a certain Margaret Delancy of the kingdom of Great Britain : Therefore.

SECT. I. *Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That the state treasurer is hereby authorized and required to pay to George Nagle, or his order, two thousand three hundred and thirteen dollars and nine cents, as full compensation for all costs and damages which he has sustained in consequence of his being evicted by due course of law, from a tract of one hundred and eighty-nine acres and ninety-nine perches of land, in Allen township, in the county of Northampton which he held under a title derived from this commonwealth : *provided always,* that any money that may be due to the commonwealth by the said Nagle, in his own right, or as security for said M'Nair, on mortgage granted to the commonwealth, by
