CHAPTER XIVIII.

An ACT to enable the accountant officers to adjust and settle the accounts of services and expenditures in relation to the militia, called into the services of the United States and of this State.

SECT. 1. BE it enacted by the senate and bouse of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the accountant officers are hereby authorized and required to adjust and settle the accounts of the officers who were engaged in pursuance of the orders of the governor of this commonwealth, in calling out and providing provisions and accommodations, and marching to the place of rendezvous, the volunteers and militia of Pennsylvania which have been called into the service of the United States.

Secr. 11. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the accountant officers shall regulate themselves in the to the usages adjustment of said accounts, by the principles and usages in and practices under the United States for similar services and exadjustment of said accounts, by the principles and usages in penses: provided however, that if it shall be made appear to the satisfaction of the accountant officers, that other and greater services and supplies were rendered, or expenses necessarily incurred in relation to the volunteers and militia aforesaid, it shall be their duty to admit the same.

Sect. III. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the accountant officers are hereby directed to Accounts of supernumerary officers to be set settle the accounts of the officers, who on the organizatled. tion of the militia, at the place of rendezvous, become supernumerary.

SECT. IV. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That on the settlement of the accounts aforesaid, the auditor general shall draw his warrant on the state treasurer for the balance which may appear to be due thereon, and said balance so found due shall be paid by the state treasurer out of any money in the treasury.

SECT. v. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the accountant officers, as soon as the accounts in re-

CHAPTER XLIX.

SECT. 1.
