An ACT to incorporate " The Society of Artists of the United States," by the name of the Columbian Society of Artists.

WHEREAS a number of artists and other persons desirous of encouraging and promoting the exercise of our own genius and industry, in the production of works of art, and of establishing schools for the instruction of those disposed to cultivate them, as also of creating a fund for the aid of decayed artists, and of the widows and orphans of deceased artists; for these and other laudable purposes, and for the better and more permanent accomplishment of their objects, have petitioned to be made a body corporate: Therefore,

SECT. II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the said society shall consist of artists of the following whatdescription professions, viz. painters, sculptors, architects, and engravers, compose the steand of amateur members, the terms on which membership ciety. shall be acquired and lost, to be determined by the by-laws of

the society.

SECT. III. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the artists shall be divided into two classes, the members Divided into of the first class shall be called Fellows or Academicians, and shall be appointed in such manner as the society shall by their by-laws direct; the remaining artists shall constitute the second class, and shall be called Associates. The society may confer the title of " Honorary" member on any foreign artist, or other person of distinguished merit, in this or any other country.

SECT. IV. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the stated meetings of the society shall be on the first Stated meetings Wednesday of each month, and the stated meetings in May, August, November, and February, shall be called quarterly meetings, and the stated meeting in January shall be called the annual meeting: the society shall also have power to meet on its own adjournment, or at the call of any officer or other person or persons duly authorized by by-law to call quorum a meeting. A quorum of the society shall consist of thirteen members.

SECT. v. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the schools for instruction in the arts which either are or may be instituted by the society, shall be placed under the direction of the fellows or academicians, who shall present a written report of their progress to the society, at its quarterly meetings, and at other meetings, as often as they shall think necessary: the fellows or academicians, also shall have the regulation of such public exhibitions of the works of art, as the society may from time to time appoint.

SECT. VII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,

That the society shall have power to create a permanent fund for the purpose of granting relief to decayed artists, who are

members of its own body, and to the widows and orphans of artists who died members of the society, which fund shall consist of all monies or other property of whatever kind or quality, which may from time to time come into their hands by gift, donation, bequest or otherwise, for this express purpose, together with such sums of money or such other pro-Appropriation of to be invested in said fund: the capital of this fund shall be the capital and inalienably appropriated to the aforesaid beauty and its annual income or such portion thereof as the society shall appoint, shall be distributed among the decayed artists who are members of the society, and the widows and orphans of artists who have died members of it, in such portions and in such manner as the society shall by by law direct; provided, that if any part of the said annual income shall not be so used, it shall go to increase the capital of the fund and to no other pur-But the society shall at all times have full right to grant donations to any benevolent or useful purpose, out of any
