CHAPTER LXXIII.

An ACT explanatory of an act, entitled, " An act erecting part of Northampton county into a separate county."

CHAPTER LXXIV.

An ACT vesting in the guardians and overseers of the poor for the city and county of Philadelphia, a certain burial ground on the west side of Schuylkill near the upper ferry, for the use of the poor of said county.

WHEREAS it appears, that a certain piece of ground situate on the west side of Schuylkill, near the upper terry, in the county of Philadelphia, has been recognized as a burial ground from the earliest settlement of Pennsylvania, and which appears to be the property of this commonwealth; and whereas, the guardians of the poor for the above mentioned city and county, have no place for the interment of such poor persons as may die under their care: Therefore,

Certain burial ground on the west side of Schuylkill, vested in the overseers and guirdians of the poor for the city and county of Philadelphia.

SECT. I. He it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the right and title of this commonwealth to the tract of land or burial ground above mentioned, situate on the west side of Schuylkill near the upper ferry, bounded by lands of Elizabeth Powell, and others, beginning at a post corner of Elizabeth Powell, or Bingham's land; thence extending by the same north seventytwo degrees, west fifty two perches, to a post, and east fortythree perches, to a post; thence by marsh land, south twentyone degrees and a half east, seventeen perches and a quarter, to the place of beginning; containing about two acres and twentytwo perches, be the same more or less, be, and the same is hereby vested in and confirmed to the guardians and overseers of the poor, for the city and county of Philadelphia, and their successors, in trust to and for the use of the poor thereof, as a burial ground forever; provided always, that nothing herein contained
