## CHAPTER LXV.

An ACT supplementary to the act, entitled "An act to regulate the general elections, within this commonwealth," so far as respects the city of Philadelphia.

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the common wealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the passing of this act, the inspectors to be chosen in the city of Philadelphia to conduct the general election or a majority of them when met for the purpose of choosing judges, as is provided for in the fourth section of the act to which this is a supplement, shall choose and take to their assistance six respectable citizens, qualified to vote, in addition to the number provided for by law; who, together with those provided for shall be the judges to assist the inspectors in conducting the elections held in said city; and the citizens so chosen, shall possess all the powers, and perform all the duties, and shall receive the same compensation, and be subject to all the penalties provided for by the act to which this is a supplement.

## CHAPTER LXVI.

An ACT for the relief of sundry persons who furnished provisions and other necessaries for those volunteers who marched to the relief of the frontiers of the state of Ohio.

Sect. 1. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That the accountant department be, and they hereby are authorized and required to settle the accounts of the committee of arrangement who were appointed by the volunteers, who in the month of August, one thousand eight hundred and twelve, marched from the twenty-third regiment of the militia of this commonwealth, for the defence of the frontiers of the state of Ohio, or with any one of the said committee or other person duly authorized to produce for settlement such accounts, and to allow said committee on such settlement, what they shall think just and reasonable, for supplying said volunteers with provisions, baggage waggons, forage and other necessaries which may have been by them furnished, which amount shall be paid
