SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid*, That the accountant department be authorized to settle the accounts of Samuel Powers, who was appointed by the volunteers who marched in the month of August one thousand eight hundred and twelve, from the neighbourhood of Beavertown, for the defence of the frontiers of the state of Ohio, and to allow said Samuel Powers, on his producing his accounts to said department for settlement, what they shall think just and reasonable for supplying said volunteers with provisions, ammunition, baggage waggons, forage and other necessaries which may have been by him furnished, which amount shall be paid by the state treasurer in the usual manner: *provided*, the same does not exceed the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars. Accounts of Samuel Powers to be settled.

SECT. III. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid*, That the accountant officers be and they hereby are authorized and required to adjust and settle the necessary expenses incurred by a committee of arrangement of the one hundred and thirtieth regiment for furnishing baggage waggons, forage and other necessaries when prepared for marching under the alarm and on the occasion aforesaid, and to pay the same to any one of said committee, or to any other person by them duly authorized: *provided*, the same shall not exceed the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars. Also certain expenses for baggage waggons, &c.

CHAPTER LXVII.

An ACT releasing to Rebecca Reed the right of this commonwealth to a certain escheated estate.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same*, That all the right, title and interest that may be in this commonwealth by escheat arising or to arise by reason of the death of a certain Timothy Reed, late of George's township, in Fayette county, and commonwealth of Pennsylvania, without heirs or any known kindred in and to a certain messuage and tract of land, situate in the township and county aforesaid, adjoining lands respectively of James Downard, William Morgan, Escheated estate released to Rebecca Reed.

William Vance, and James Foutz, containing fifty-two acres and one hundred and fifty-one perches, strict measure, be the same more or less, with the appurtenances, be and the same is hereby released to Rebecca Reed, widow of the said Timothy Reed, her heirs and assigns: *provided*, that nothing herein contained shall in anywise prejudice the rights of individuals or impair any other title to the said premises, than that which the commonwealth has or might have by reason of the said escheat.

CHAPTER LXVIII.

An ACT providing for the inspection of spirituous liquors.

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That from and after the first day of May next, all distilled spirituous liquors of domestic manufacture, shall prior to exportation from the port of Philadelphia, be gauged, inspected and marked as is hereinafter directed.

Spirituous liquors to be inspected, &c.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That no cask containing distilled spirituous liquors of domestic manufacture, shall be exported unless the same be made of well seasoned white oak free from sap, and made tight and secured with twelve good hoops on all barrels, and with sixteen good hoops on all double barrels and hogsheads.

Description of casks.

SECT. III. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the following shall be received and taken as a standard regulation for the inspectors of domestic manufactured liquors: *that is to say,*

Standard regulations.

When liquor shall be ten degrees below hydrometer proof it shall be marked as liquor of first proof.

How to be marked.

When liquor shall be five degrees below hydrometer proof, it shall be marked as liquor of second proof.

When liquor shall be hydrometer proof, or one hundred parts spirit and one hundred parts water, it shall be marked as liquor of third proof.

When liquor shall be five degrees above hydrometer proof, it shall be marked as liquor of the fourth proof.

SECT. IV. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the governor of this commonwealth be and he is hereby di-
