CHAPTER CXLIII.

An ACT authorizing the governor to appoint commissioners to view and examine the river Monongahela from the borough of Pittsburg to the southern boundary of the state, for purposes therein mentioned.

Sect. 1. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, commissioners That the governor be and he is hereby authorized to appoint to view the river Monongathree competent and disinterested persons, citizens of this com- hela. monwealth, one of whom shall be a practical surveyor, to view and examine the river Monongahela, from the junction of said river with the Allegheny river, to the point where the southern boundary of this state crosses said river; whose duty it shall be to repair to the borough of Pittsburgh aforesaid, and to view and examine the aforesaid river from the point hereinbefore designated, at the borough of Pittsburg, to the point in the southern boundary aforesaid, and take the courses and distances of the se-courses and disveral meanders of the said river between the points aforesaid; thereof. and also, an accurate observation and admeasurement of the distances between the different ripples, and the elevation in feet and parts of a foot of the said ripples progressively above the horizon of Pittsburg.

SECT. 11. CHAPTER CXLIV.

An ACT for the relief of the heirs of Joseph Flora, deceased.

WHEREAS it is represented to the legislature that Joseph Flora, formerly of Paxton township in Lancaster (now Dauphin) county, by his last will and testament dated the sixteenth of September, seventeen hundred and eighty-three, bequeathed to the two children of his son Abraham, then deceased, a certain part of his estate, which by a settlement made in the Orphan's Court of Dauphin county it is ascertained amounts to three hundred and thirty-seven pounds six shillings and six pence; that the said legatees with their mother removed from the state of Pennsylvania about the year seventeen hundred and seventy-eight, and have never since been heard of; that it is not known whether they be living or dead, although diligent inquiry has been made during the thirty-six years which have elapsed since their removal; that the said Joseph Flora left six other children whose descendants are now numerous and many of them poor; and that the amount of the said bequest remains unproductive in the hands of some of the legal representatives of the said Joseph Flora; Therefore,

SECT. I. BE it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in general assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That John Wolfley, one of the executors of Conrad Wolfley, who was one of the executors of Joseph Flora, formerly of Paxton township in Lancaster (now Dauphin) county, deceased, and Christian Spayd and John M'Cammon executors of Jacob Wolfley who was an executor of the said Conrad Wolfley, be and they are hereby authorized and required to distribute the sum of three hundred and thirty-seven pounds six shillings and six pence, and the interest which
