

SECT. IX. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That when a majority of the stockholders shall make application in writing, for a general statement of the funds of the institution to be made, the board of directors shall, within thirty days, call a general meeting of the stockholders, and lay before them such statements as shall be required. Of the funds.

SECT. X. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That no director shall be competent as security for any of the officers or agents of the company, during the time he shall be a member of the board of directors. Of securities.

SECT. XI. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That this act shall be and continue in force for twenty years and no longer, for the purpose of manufacturing as aforesaid: *Provided always,* That if the said corporation shall at any time hereafter misuse or abuse any of the chartered privileges hereby granted, the legislature may at any time thereafter resume all and singular the rights, privileges, liberties and franchises hereby granted to said company. CHAPTER LXIV.

A SUPPLEMENT to an act, entitled “An act to authorize the accountant officers of this commonwealth, to open their accounts with William Henderson, late treasurer of Montgomery county.”

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same,* That it shall be the duty of the auditor general and state treasurer, to credit the account of William Henderson (for monies arising from exempt fines) with such amount of exonerations as shall appear, by the records of the commissioners of Montgomery county, to have been made for the years one thousand eight hundred and one, one thousand eight hundred and two, and one thousand eight hundred and three, and which have not been heretofore credited.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid,* That the auditor general shall draw his warrant in favor of said

William Henderson, on the state treasurer, for the balance which may be found due him.

CHAPTER LXV.

A SUPPLEMENT to the act, entitled “A further supplement to the act, entitled “an act authorizing the governor to incorporate a company for making an artificial road from the bank of the river Susquehanna, opposite Harrisburg, to Pittsburg.”

WHEREAS, the legislature of Pennsylvania did, on the ninth day of March, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, pass an act making the borough of Somerset a point in the Harrisburg and Pittsburg turnpike road, and as it has since been deemed injurious to the state of Pennsylvania, inasmuch as a sufficient number of shares have not been sold, agreeably to the said act, so as to authorize the governor to incorporate companies for making so much of said road as lies between Bedford and Greensburg, and that a great part of the road, if taken by way of the borough of Somerset, would have to pass over an uninhabited and mountainous part of the country: And whereas, the old Pennsylvania road is well known to be much shorter than the Somerset route, the ground much more suitable for a turnpike road, and the materials more convenient: Therefore,

SECT. I. *BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That* Stoystown, in the county of Somerset, be, and the same is hereby made a point through which the artificial road from the bank of the river Susquehanna opposite Harrisburg to Pittsburg, shall pass, instead of the borough of Somerset in said county, as fully to all intents and purposes, as though the town of Stoystown, and not the borough of Somerset, had been mentioned in the said act; any law or laws to the contrary notwithstanding.

SECT. II. *And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That* William Proctor, John Schell, junior, and George Rock, of the county of Bedford, John Tantlinger, Henry Fisher and George Graham, of Somerset county, be, and they are hereby appointed commissioners to do and perform all the duties required of the commissioners under the act to which this is a supplement, for that part of said road which lies between Bedford and Stoystown, and that Jacob Ankeny, John Denison and John Lehmer, of the county of Somerset, William Jack, senior, Alexander Johnston, John Ram-
